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## **Position Paper on Substance Abuse Treatment for Individuals with Intellectual and other Developmental Disabilities**

### **POLICY STATEMENT**

Individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities, like all people, may require treatment for substance abuse or dependence at some point in their lives. This treatment, when needed, must be readily available and effective for the individuals who need it.

### **ISSUE**

Currently, there is no widely used protocol for the treatment of substance abuse specific to individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities. While this issue has been ignored for years, it is evident that this gap in services is having a significant impact on the lives of many individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities. The current treatment models also do not appear to produce long-term positive outcomes for individuals with developmental disabilities.

Access to appropriate substance abuse treatment for individuals with intellectual disabilities must become a priority for the developmental disability community as well as the larger substance abuse treatment community if we ever expect to see improvement in this area. People with developmental disabilities must have accessible, dependable and high-quality treatment when a substance abuse issue manifests. Additionally, it is critically important that the treatment models used are evidence-based and have been designed to meet the unique needs of these individuals. Risk factors that are specific to individuals with developmental disabilities must also be considered.

### **POSITION**

#### **The Arc of New Jersey believes that:**

- All people, including those with intellectual and other developmental disabilities deserve compassionate, high quality and clinically-relevant treatment for substance abuse or dependence.
- Treatment for substance abuse must never be denied on the basis of the existence of an intellectual or other developmental disability.
- Individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities should have universal access to appropriate, affordable, accessible, timely, and comprehensive substance abuse treatment throughout their lives. Treatment should be based on a best-practice approach and should include the prevention and treatment of substance issues including use, abuse and dependence.
- Treatment models for substance abuse must be designed with the specific risk factors and needs of individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities in mind.
- The substance abuse treatment community must be empowered, through training and technical assistance, to address the full range of substance abuse issues that are prevalent in the lives of individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities.
- The rights of self-determination must be respected in this process. Substance abuse treatment should be provided only with the informed consent of the individual, or individual's guardian where applicable, and should be tailored to the individual's unique circumstances.
