March is National Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month



The Arc of New Jersey is the state's largest organization devoted to advocating for and supporting people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families.

Each year, The Arc of New Jersey hosts a Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month outreach event at The Statehouse in Trenton. The theme of this year's event and design contest is **"Developmental Disabilities Awareness: It Matters to Me"**. Students in grades 3 - 12 are invited to design a bulletin board, poster, and/or video that incorporates the theme of this year's campaign and illustrates the students' acceptance of all people.

Because awareness, acceptance, and inclusion matter... Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month is a perfect opportunity to educate students about the **spectrum of ability**. For example, some disabilities are visible (a person who uses a wheelchair or crutches to ambulate), while other disabilities may not be easily recognized or seen by the eye (cognitive impairments that affect the way a person speaks, learns, or interacts with others).

Our hope is that you take the theme and truly run with it! Get creative and develop a bulletin board design, poster, or video that is unique to your school and your students' understanding of the belief that *awareness and acceptance of all abilities matters*. Winning submissions will demonstrate an understanding of the diversity of disability and the need for inclusion, support, and acceptance in school and beyond.

So, how can my class get involved?

It's easy! Pick your medium:

1. Work with your class to develop a creative, eye-catching and colorful **bulletin board** or **poster** that incorporates the theme of this year's campaign. Once you and your class have finalized your design, snap a photo and e-mail it, along with the completed entry form and photo release, to **DisabilityAwarenessNJ@ArcNJ.org**

2. Create a **video** that relates to the contest theme and illustrates why you believe awareness of developmental disabilities matters. E-mail your video, along with the completed entry form and photo release, to **DisabilityAwarenessNJ@ArcNJ.org**

3. Join our **awareness campaign**: Print copies of the attached **#ItMattersToMeBecause template** and distribute to your class. Ask your students to fill in the blank space with their thoughts on why awareness matters. Students can **snap a selfie** holding the #ItMattersToMeBecause sign and tag (*a*TheArcofNJ and *a*NJSAP on Facebook and Twitter. Please include the unique campaign hashtag: **#ItMattersToMeBecause**

The photos you submit can be any size- *the bigger, the better!* Please be sure to include a copy of the completed **Official Entry Form** and signed **Photo Release** with your submission.

Let's talk PRIZES!

Classes who receive 1^{st} place will be awarded a \$100 gift card, classes who receive 2^{nd} place will be awarded a \$50 gift card and classes who receive 3^{rd} place will be awarded a \$25 gift card.

There will be a total of three winning submissions chosen from each category: Elementary level (3^{rd} , 4^{th} , 5^{th} grades), Middle School level (6^{th} , 7^{th} , and 8^{th} grades), and High School ($9^{th} - 12^{th}$ grades). Sorry, but individual submissions will not be considered.

Winning classes will be **notified** by **February 24, 2017**.
