DSP Coalition Secures \$20M in FY18 Budget

On July 4th, Governor Christie signed the FY18 Budget and it includes \$20 million for increased wages for DSPs. We worked tirelessly these past 12 months as Chair of the Coalition for a DSP Living Wage to secure this funding, and we are very pleased to have obtained this victory in year one of our campaign. We thank everyone who supported the Coalition this past year, as we know this outcome would not have been possible without you. We are grateful to everyone who participated in our action alerts, forwarded our materials, came out to our lobbying day in Trenton and shared our posts on social media. This is wonderful

The Arc Stands with US Senator Against Medicaid Cuts

The Arc of New Jersey and The Arc of Essex County participated in a press conference with Senator Bob Menendez last month to highlight the threats to Medicaid in the Senate's version of the American Health Care Act. Eileen Stuart, whose daughter Laurie has lived in an Arc Essex group home for more than 20 years, told the Senator that Laurie has complex medical needs, including seizures, and that she will always require longterm supports and services. She explained that Laurie can't afford to lose the supports she receives or the home she shares with other individuals with I/DD, and that she worries about what will happen to Laurie after she's gone if Medicaid is slashed the way the Senate is proposing. She also told the Senator that it's only because of Medicaid that Laurie is able to live an integrated life in the community. Following the event, Eileen spoke to



multiple reporters about the importance of Medicaid and the impact per capita caps and related cuts would have on her daughter and thousands like her with I/DD living in New Jersey.

Presentation for Families, Healthy Lifestyle tips for Self-Advocates



Mainstreaming Medical Care Director Beverly Roberts and The Arc of NJ Family Institute Coordinator Cheryl Crick presented on SSI & Medicaid in Bergen County last month. The event was an opportunity to educate families on a variety of topics, including: what happens to SSI and Medicaid when the parent of an individual with I/DD retires, or if they become disabled, ABLE Accounts, and how can these accounts can be helpful, and PPP services and what the process is for accessing those services.
