

Protection of Pupil Rights Ammendment (PPRA)



This applies to state and local education agencies or anyone receiving money from the U.S. Department of Education. It sets rules for giving students surveys, analyses, or evaluations that cover any of eight protected area.

01 Political Affiliations

Or beliefs of the student or the student's parent



03 Sex Behavior

Or attitudes



04 Illegal, anti-social

Self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior

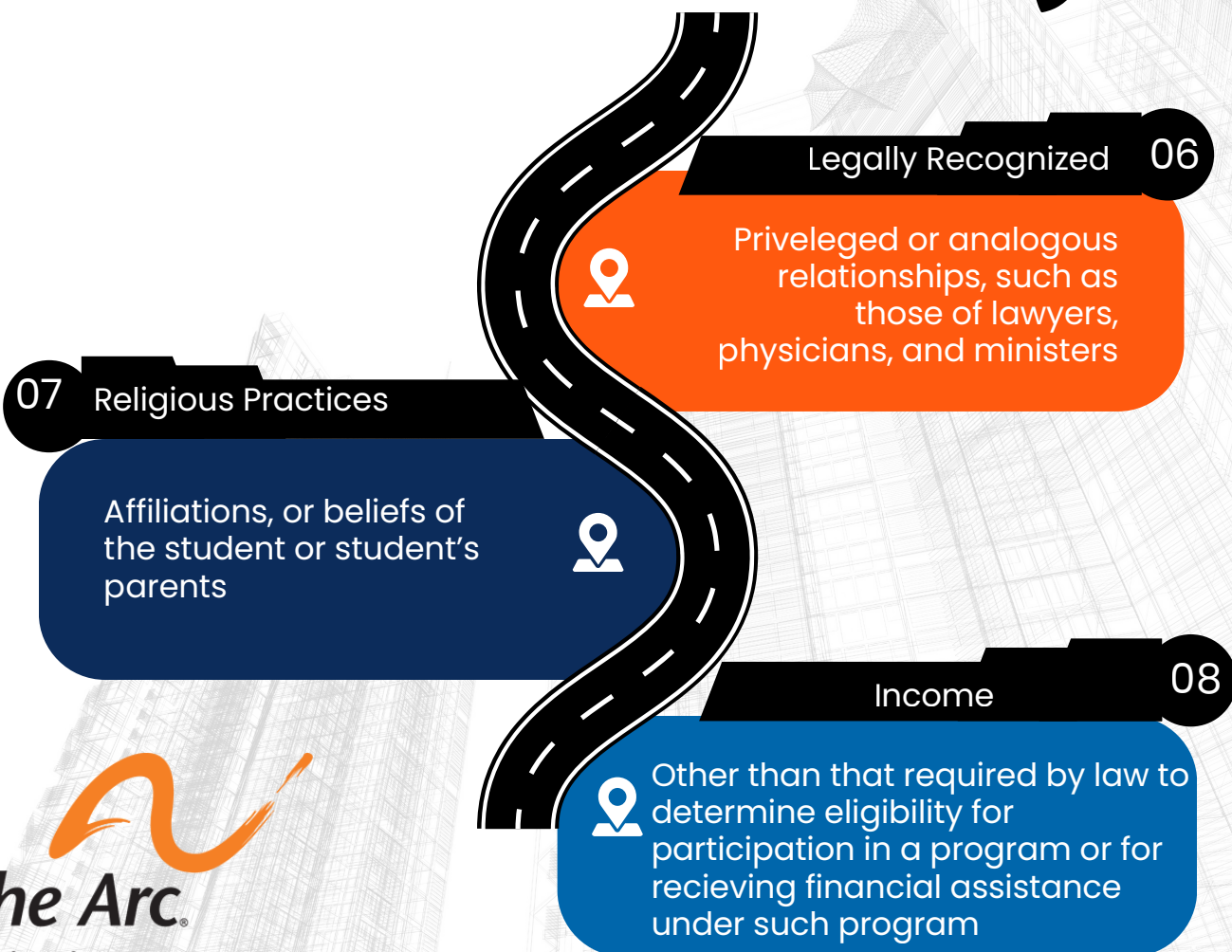
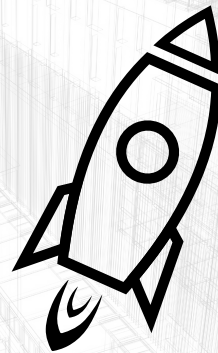


05 Critical Appraisals

Of other individuals with whom respondents have close family relationships

PPRA also covers student privacy, marketing surveys, parent access to information, and some physical exams for minors. When a student turns 18 or is legally independent, these rights shift from the parents to the student.
