A Decade of Growth

September 1950

The first national convention of the National Association of Parents and Friends is held in Minneapolis, MN.

September 1951

The national convention adopted an amendment to change its name to NARC. As the NJ Parents Group w as concerned that the name w as not in keeping w ith the parent-based nature of the organization, it w asn't until April 1953 that they changed the name of the NJ Chapter to NJARC.

October 1957

Theodore Lucas, 33 of Asbury Park, becomes the first Executive Director of NJARC, and an office is established in the Columbus Building at 524 1/2 Hamilton Ave, Trenton. This action was deemed necessary as the State Council grew to realize that volunteers alone could no longer support the grow ing chapters and ongoing statewide advocacy.

December 1957

The annual statew ide fundraising campaign is declared "the most successful ever" with more than \$200,000 raised. That would equal \$1.57 million in today's dollars.



During the 1950's, the major work of The Arc included:


- recommendations for amendments to the NJ State Statutes to establish preliminary hearings in criminal cases involving individuals with I/DD to determine level of disability
- the establishment of a Division of MR w ithin the NJ Department of Institutions and Agencies
- advocacy to improve the conditions at the State's five institutions including addressing understaffing, aging facilities and poor food quality
- assisting local chapters to establish programs and direct services; by the end of 1959, the 17 chapters of The Arc operated 73 community programs
- advocacy with the NJ Department of Education to improve educational opportunities for children with I/DD
- the establishment of a research fund with the goal to raise \$1 million to fund research projects on the prevention and causes of VDD
- advocacy to pass legislation requiring routine testing of new borns for Phenylketonuria (PKU), a treatable genetic disorder

Fun Fact: The 1957 annual state conference of The Arc was held on October 19 at the Johnstone Training and Research Center, Bordentown. The theme was "The...Child (with I/DD) in the Community". Registration for the conference was \$.50 and lunch was \$1.50.
