

Peer to Peer: Telling Your Truth


- Make sure survivors have a way to get help and healing before speaking out

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Legislation & Policy

- The Americans with Disabilities Act, Title II accessibility and accommodations
- The Arc of Arizona report seeking research
- The Arc of VA sex education for students with disabilities
- The Arc of Texas & Texas Advocates consent for examination



The Arc of Texas & Texas Advocates

- HB 4531
 - If someone gets sexually assaulted, the person with I/DD has a right to get a sexual assault exam
 - Even if the guardian or caregiver says they don't want the person to get the exam
 - The vote was unanimous



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New Jersey's Accomplishments



- Partners in Justice (PIJ) meets quarterly and supported this summit
- Self-Advocacy Project added healthy sexuality to their program
- The Arc of NJ conducted a research project to identify sex ed programs in school districts
- NJ CASA conducting needs assessment to identify underserved populations in the state, due to their involvement with PIJ



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Marginalized Identities

- American Indians are the victims of rape and sexual assault at a rate that is 3.5 times higher than that of any other race in the United States
- One in two transgender individuals are sexually abused or assaulted at some point in their lives
- Only 16% of men with documented histories of sexual abuse considered themselves to have been sexually abused, compared to 64% of women with documented histories in the same study

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Mandatory Reporting

- Shouldn't it be the person's decision to decide if, when and how to report a crime?
- Does the victim fully understand the potential ramifications of what could happen after a report is made?
- Can accessible supports and healing services be guaranteed to the victim after a mandatory report is made?
- Is the system re-victimizing the victim with disabilities



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Consent is About Communication & Empowerment

- Can a person with cognitive disabilities give consent to sex?
- How do people with disabilities learn when it is safe to consent versus when it isn't safe? Especially if they aren't taught?
- What is a guardian's role when it comes to this issue?
- How much autonomy does a person with disabilities have?
- How does supported decision-making (SDM) apply?



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Dignity of Risk

Dignity of risk is the idea that self-determination and the right to take reasonable risks are essential for dignity and self esteem and should not be impeded by excessively-cautious caregivers, concerned about their duty of care
